Two New Locations for District 14-K Bowl-a-thon

The annual District 14-K Bowl-a-thon is coming up this month - Sunday, April 19 - and it will be held at two NEW locations.

Lions, Lionesses and Leos can bowl one game from 1 to 4 p.m. at the Hampton Lanes, 326 Main St., Northampton, and the Haja Rose Bowl at 801 N. 15th St., Allentown.

Pledge sheets were mailed out earlier to club presidents so that our members can solicit funds from their neighbors, friends and co-workers that will be devoted to sight-related needs. You can collect outright donations or per-pin donations, based on your bowling score. The highest pledge bowler will receive a \$50 monetary gift and the second highest pledge bowler will receive \$25.

Sixty percent of what is collected will go to the clubs and 40% to the district. No money will be collected at the door on the day of the bowl-a-thon. Turn the funds over to

your club treasurer and the money will be divided up for the club and the district. The club treasurer will then mail one check for 40% of all donations collected to bowl-thon chairman Nick Grazio at 6627 Blue Heather Court, Macungie, PA 18062.

In the letter sent out on March 7th, Grazio asked that he be informed, either by e-mail at ngrazio@gmail.com or phone 610-395-2285, with the name of a club member responsible for the project, the number of bowlers, the time your club will be bowling, and at which bowling alley. He needs this information by Sunday, April 12.

Your editor and family from Georgia were at the Hampton Lanes this past week for the first time and we were surprised at the number of games that are available to youngsters. There are also green plastic lizards or alligators on which the little folk can aim the bowling ball toward the pins.

The contest theme this year was "Peace, Love & Understanding."




The luncheon will start at 12:00 Noon in the Leithsville Fire Co. banquet hall at 1995 Leithsville Rd., Hellertown.


He thanked the Lions and Lioness clubs and their members who have supported the calendar project this Lions year, for you are the hope of many deserving individuals.
