These were just some of the activities included in the Center for Vision Loss's first ever Camp I CAN! for children 7-13 who are blind or visually

impaired.

Our 5 campers, all residents of the Lehigh Valley, met together from 9 am-2:30 pm, 4 days per week from July 21-24 and July 28-31, 2014, in this new program jointly sponsored with the PA Department of Labor and Industry, Bureau of Blindness and Visual Services. Rita Lang, camp director and the Center for Vision Loss's Manager of Innovative Programming, noted that while the camp's activities, crafts and field trips provided lots of summer fun, they were designed to teach lifeskills, orientation and mobility skills, vision rehabili-

The next convention meeting will be on Monday, Sept. 29 at Christ UCC Church, Airport Road. At that time, preliminary plans will be started for the 2015 conven-

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
