## Melvin Jones Fellowships Part Of March 25 District Convention

For the first time, Melvin Jones Fellowships and Progressive Melvin Jones Fellowships will be presented at the annual District 14-K convention on March 25. The MJF program, established in 1973, recognizes donations of \$1,000 to Lions International Foundation (LCIF).

New MJF's receive a pin, commemorative plaque and a letter from the LCIF chairperson. If the donor so chooses, he/she may use their donation credit to recognize another individual with a MJF.

District coordinator PDG Joseph Chunko provided a guideline to giving at the recent Cabinet meeting.

Progressive Melvin Jones Fellowship provides an opportunity to advance. For each subsequent donation of \$1,000 beyond the initial donation donors receive a unique PMJF pin in accord with their level of giving.

### Areas of Giving

LCIF will now be able to help more people than ever before. Eligibility now includes donations to five special program areas, directing their support to:

- Area of Greatest

Need: Supplementing initiatives where additional funding is necessary or where the need is most urgent.

- Disaster: Enables LCIF to direct the funds most in need following disasters to provide for immediate, mid and long-term relief.

- Sight: Funds seek to support hundreds of sight-related activities ranging from equipping eye clinics to Braille computers for the visually impaired.

- Youth: Supports the Lions Quest program and other initiatives such as educational infrastructure improvements and programs to assist at-risk youth.

- Measles: Funds support the purchase and distribution of the measles and rubella vaccination in select developing countries.

### Did You Know?

Districts, clubs and individuals can donate to LCIF through the MJF program, but only an individual can receive the recognition.

Melvin Jones Fellowships can be named in honor or in memory of an individual.

The Fellowships do not need to be paid in full at one time; minimum installments to LCIF of \$100 can be paid over a five-year period to total \$1,000, at which time the MJF application is completed.

### MJF Honors at Banquet

This year the Melvin Jones Fellowships will be presented after the PID's speech at the Saturday night convention banquet.

PDG Chunko said we will need the Lions clubs to act quickly to let him know who they will be honoring with a Melvin Jones Fellowship or a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellowship. It could take 4-6 weeks to receive the materials depending on the number of plaques that have to be made. To pay respectful tribute to the recipients, this info needs to be furnished to PDG Joe so that it can be read when a new MJF or PMJF is recognized: Name of the club; name of the recipient; family information; number of years in Lions; positions held in Lions; other community or church affiliation; reason for the honor. The mini-bio should be 100 words or less. Lion Joe needs to have the information no later than March 10, 2017.

Any member of District 14-K is a member of Charitable Enterprises.

The Board of Directors consists of the District Governor, the 1st and 2nd Vice District Governors, the Immediate Past District Governor and four members from each region, of which three shall be appointed by the District Governor and the remaining nine shall be elected by the clubs from their region at the annual membership reorganizational meeting in May. The board shall meet bi-monthly.

Currently, said Charitable president PDG Joe Chunko in his report at the November Cabinet meeting, their biggest fund-raisers are the Pennsylvania Daily Number Calendar Sales and the Lions All-Star Soccer Classic. (Since then the soccer classic has been dropped after 35 years for lack of support by the Lions, Lionesses and players.) "We need all District 14-K Lions to help support these fund-raisers," he said. January 1 marked the second half of the calendar fund-raiser year. Prizes will remain the same, but the charge for the calendar is now just \$15.00.

would do, too. Ask a question and you're liable to get too much information. At work for Sight Life I often hear our VP Michael Beardson say, 'At Sight Life we take the higher road.' So, guess what I did!

"I talked my fiancé into going with me: we made a day of it. The research seminar at Salus in the morning and then the Mutter Museum, we've heard so much about. I must say, I enjoyed the research seminar immensely; the Mutter Museum, well it is disturbingly informative. During the opening remarks, I learned for the most part

grants from the PLSCERF provide funding for pilot data allowing the researcher to apply for larger grants through other organizations.

"Attending this program made me proud to be a Lion and realize the impact our

coin cards have on humanity. I've heard it said many times in District 14-K that 'the people at Salus do great work,' but didn't realize until this past Saturday that the people at Salus DO great work! The grant process was also explained. PLSCERF receives the applications and forwards them to their volunteer board of renowned out-of-state researchers to review and report their findings on a scale of 1 to 10. The PLSCERF takes that information and their views to award or reject the application. Since grant money from this foundation is only used to support Pennsylvania pilot data, using out of state researchers as reviewers avoids conflict of interest.
