## Three Winners of Peace Poster Contest Picked; No. 1 Sent to State for Judging

The top three Peace Posters in District 14-K have been picked by a panel of Lions past district governors, IPCC Karen Brady, PDG Fred Folland and PDG Linwood Gehris, according to chairperson PDG Joseph Chunko.

Taking first place is the poster of Shea Black, 11, a fifth grader at Wind Gap Middle School in Pen Argyl, proclaiming that "Peace is made everywhere." The sponsoring club, Plainfield Township Lions Club. The

poster was forwarded to Pa. MD-14 Lions for judging in the State contest.

The second place winner was Catie Feathernby, 12, a seventh grade student at Eyer Middle School in Macungie. The Emmaus Lions Club was the sponsor.

Winning third place was the poster of Robert Ulsh, 11, a student in St. Francis de Chantel School in Easton. His quote: "The people and cultures of our world can create a future of peace by living together in

All three poster winners and their parents will be invited to attend the District 14-K Convention luncheon on Saturday, March 24, at which time they will be presented with the winning prizes. PDG Chunko now has the posters and he will contact the parents to confirm that they will be able to attend the luncheon.

## "Taste of Shadows" Leaves Diners in the Dark

Ninety people came together on Thursday, October 19, 2017 at the Green Pond Country Club, Bethlehem, to experience vision loss for a short time at the Center for Vision Loss's A Taste of the Shadows vision loss awareness fundraiser. The following members of District 14-K attended: DG Don Kaufman and his wife Cindy, President of the Emmaus Lioness-Lions; IPDG Marsha Johnston and her husband Brian, and VDG1 Karlene Laub.

During the Gathering Hour before dinner, guests enjoyed hors d'oeuvres and tasted craft beers provided by Penn Beverage & Sales and wines provided by Franklin Hill Vineyards while they mingled and checked out the many prizes in the New Focus Raffle. During dinner, the guests wore blindfolds while they ate their salad and entrée, poured water and passed rolls and butter. During dessert they then exchanged their blindfolds for simulator glasses that provided visual impressions of each of the four age-related eye diseases commonly affecting

seniors. A sighted guide at each table explained how to navigate through the meal and shared information about the agency's vision rehabilitation support services which can improve the quality of life for clients with vision loss.

After dinner, Executive Director Doug Yingling introduced the organization's new video, "Dorothy's Story," produced by ASR Media Productions. It tells the moving story of how one client has worked through her adjustment to vision loss. The guests also viewed "Seeing With Your Heart," a second new video produced by Daymarks Productions to document "The Animal Kindness Project," a Community Service Project to benefit Animals in Distress. This project was driven by the campers, ages 7-13 with vision loss, who attended the agency's Camp 1 CAN! in July. TeenWorks, an affinity group of the United Way of the Greater Lehigh Valley, funded the project. Lois Gadek, Board President of Animals in Distress, expressed her appreciation for the dedica-



## Lions Beacon Lodge Had Successful Season

The Pennsylvania Lions Beacon Lodge camp board of directors met recently at the camp. All of the staff did a fantastic job making sure our campers had the summer of a lifetime.
