Year-end Cabinet Meeting Held by District 14-K in Allentown Diner

The final breakfast Cabinet Meeting of District 14-K for the 2017-2018 Lions year was held on Saturday, June 9 at the Brass Rail Restaurant in Allentown.

First off, it had a note from Global Membership chairperson, PCC Lion Karen Brady, that the district lost 16 members since the last Cabinet meeting, down from 875 members to 859, as we continue to lose members..

She said that Lions Clubs International has a special deal for the month of June. They are waiving entrance fees for new members who join between June 7 and June 30. "This is a great incen-

tive to ask someone to join and for them to join now. Everyone you know deserves to be asked to join Lions. Remember to tell them that it is a privilege to be asked, and let them know what your club does in the community, what we do in our district, and what Lions in general do for the rest of the world." Though the Lions year ends soon, the month is still young.

On the opposite page of the minutes taken by Lion Cheryl Fatzinger at the meeting, District Governor Donald Kaufman listed activities for the third quarters -- 367 activities, 6,027 Lions hours, 42,535 people served, \$13,921 funds

raised, and \$42,789 funds donated. The final words: "Every Member Matters."

Committee Reports

PDG Glen Santee, chairman for the 100-year Lions Club International anniversary, reported that it will conclude on July 4th. Going into the anniversary year, LCI's goal was to serve 100 million people in four areas: Youth, Environment, Vision and Hunger. We went way beyond that. The majority of our clubs received patches and legacy project recognition. Many clubs filled their websites with photos of celebrations along with memories of past events.

He said, "We are going into the future as Lions more dedicated than ever to live our theme WE SERVE! Now look forward to what we as clubs of 14-K are going to do to embrace our future! There is no limit to what we can do. Use your voice and ability to shape your Lions future. You are the Lions who are changing the world. Thank you!"

RULES for clubs who purchase Peace Poster kits have been given by chairperson PDG Joe

Chunko, who gave them again at the meeting. The theme to be followed by boys and girls in schools or in organized groups is "Kindness Matters." The kits cost \$11.95, plus shipping, handling and any applicable taxes. The deadline for clubs to order them from the Club Supplies Sales Department at Lions headquarters is October 1.

LIONS OF PA report given by PDG Linwood Gehris showed a balance

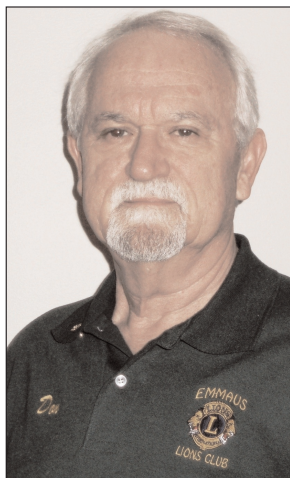

14-K IPDG Kaufman Appointed To Fill 1st Vice Dist. Gov. Slot

At a special Executive Committee Meeting called by Honorary District Governors Advisory Committee President Larry Snyder on Wednesday, June 20, 2018, Immediate District Governor Donald R. Kaufman was unanimously appointed 1st First Vice District Governor of District 14-K in a count of 19 votes, subject to the further approval of Lions Clubs International.

Despite several attempts to fill the office of 2nd Vice District Governor in the year 2017-18, no one stepped up to the plate, and thus no one was on the official ballot for 1st VDG at the May 24, 2018 District Convention.

It was decided to take this route, by appointment at this Special Meeting, with Gov.

Kaufman as the nominee.

A Letter of Intent and a Club Resolution were received by the Honorary D.G.

Advisory Committee requesting that D.G. Kaufman's name be placed in nomination to be appointed as First Vice-District Governor.

Governor Kaufman read his qualifications at the meeting: A Lion since 2011, he has served as club tail twister, club 3rd VDG, club 2nd VDG, club President and District Governor for 2017-2018. The letter was signed by District Governor Donald R. Kaufman.

A Letter of Resolution was received from the Emmaus Lions Club stating that the Board of Directors and the membership of the Emmaus Lions Club supports the candidacy of District Governor Kaufman, as a member in good standing of the Emmaus Lions Club, for the high office of First Vice-District Governor for the year 2018-2019. The letter was signed by the Club President, Lion Marty Beers, and Club Secretary, Lion Elliot Billman.

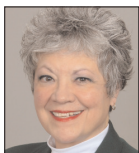

Hellertown Lions Name Lion Of Year, Dedicate Pavilion Roof

The weather was perfect and the turnout was large on Thursday evening, June 14, Flag Day, for the Hellertown Lions' annual picnic at Albert J. Fritchman Reservoir Park in Lower Saucon Township. The club's "Lion of the Year" was recognized, new officers and board members were installed, and a new roof on the park's pavilion was dedicated.

Although the park is owned by the Hellertown

Borough Authority, the pavilion was built by the Hellertown Lions.

District Governor-elect Karlene Laub explained at the dedication ceremony that at a function held at the park last year, club members noticed that the pavilion roof was in disrepair.

The Borough Authority did not have the funds to replace it, so Lion Debbie Heidecker-Repash chaired a fundraising

effort that ultimately raised half [\$5,447.50] of the nearly \$11,000 that was needed to replace it. Matching funds were provided by the Lions of Pennsylvania Foundation.

"I commend you for all you've done," Laub told members of the club, who later presented representatives from the Borough Authority with a ceremonial check and committed to continue to help maintain the park, which is enjoyed by people from throughout the area.

Another highlight of the evening was the presentation of the Lion of the Year award to President-elect Jesse Repash, who has been active in many of the group's altruistic endeavors, from their aluminum-recycling program to their popular hot dog wagon.

"I've been involved with the Lions for a long time, most of my life," Repash said, noting that he is following in the footsteps of his father, a former Lion. "I really appreciate this." Outgoing president Bruce Browne said of Repash, of Lower Saucon Township, "He has truly achieved the Lions motto of 'We Serve'."

Many other apprecia-

tion awards were presented to club members for their dedication to serving the organization, which in turn benefits the community. A special award was also presented to Lion Cathy Leibensperger for her outstanding leadership and dedicated service as secretary to the organization over the last four years. Repash and the other new club officers will assume their duties July 1.
