Some of the items a pantry needs may not be available from Second Harvest, so they need to buy cheaper than we can. When you make a donation, please remember how we can best serve our pantries.

"This year's Care & Share goal was 55,000 pounds. Wow, are we underway!? We are now in our seventh month and we have donated the

equivalent of 57,140 pounds. We have five more months this year and I'm confident we're not stopping now and will make this a banner year to care and share."

Three Applications OKd by Eye Research

In his report to the Cabinet on Feb. 21, PDG Glen Santee noted three applications were approved by the Pa. Lions Sight Conservation & Eye Research Foundation. One was for \$10,000 on "Tracking of Retinal Development of Human

Embryonic Stem Cells Using a Stage-Top Incubator Chamber." Another of \$6,000 was for "Regenerative Ophthalmology Preserving Vision Using Extracellular Matrix Technology After Retinal or Optic Nerve Injury." The third was \$12,000 for "Choroideremia: Defining Natural History and Outcome Measures."

The applications were submitted by three specialist doctors from an eye and ear institute and a school of medicine

PDG Santee announced that there will be an eye research seminar in Hershey on Oct. 24. He noted that the Foundation funds research, but doesn't buy equipment. They do help eye banks. Ninety clubs in four districts of MD-14 gave \$19,125 last year.

Calendar Sales Up For Charitable

Lion David Fatzinger reported an improvement in Charitable Enterprises calendar sales when he showed the figures on Feb. 21. As of Feb. 7, the 2014-15 total sales are at 399 (279 full year and 120 half year), compared to 334 (280 full year and 79 half year) for 2013-14.

Still, that's only 39.9% of the 1,000 calendar cards that were sold. While there was an increase, it was in the half year sales. And one of those won \$500.00!

As of January 31 there have been 54 payouts totaling \$2,640.

New calendars will be distributed at the April 11 convention to club secretaries. Lion Fatzinger asks that the secretaries or presidents show the calendars, read the letter to their members, and encourage them to support Charitable Enterprises' efforts to furnish eye surgeries, eye exams, glasses, hearing aids, and other vital needs as we serve our communities. If the club officers don't present the calendars in April or May, ask them why they've chosen not to, says Lion Dave.

He thanked the Lions and Lioness clubs and their members who have supported the calendar project this Lions year, for you are the hope of many deserving individuals.

Hearing Research Foundation Report Given at 14-K Meeting

IPDG Dennis Butz and Lion Joanne Santee, board members of the Pa. Lions Hearing Foundation, provided a report at the recent Cabinet meeting.

They reported that there are more Americans with a hearing impairment than there are with heart disease, kidney disease, cancer, multiple sclerosis, venereal disease, TB and blindness - combined. And twice as many deaf people as there are blind people.

The Foundation has received six applications for research grants this year - two from Penn State Medical School in Hershey, two from the University of Pittsburgh, one from Salus University in Philadelphia and one from Indiana University of Pennsylvania. They will be reviewed.

In keeping with the Lions of Pennsylvania interest on youth activities, special emphasis is encouraged on research to prevent deafness and hearing problems among our youth. All research grants awarded by the Foundation are within Pennsylvania. If clubs would like to give any financial support to the research to find a cure for ear disease and deafness, make donations to the Pa. Lions Hearing Research Foundation.

Diabetes Trust Transfers Funds

The Lehigh Valley Diabetes Trust will be transferring the \$15,000 designated for diabetic needs to Charitable Enterprises.

The trust will not be operational for a year unless there is a need demonstrated, says Mark Bateman.

IRS paperwork has been filed for 2014 from January 1 through December 31, as is their policy. There is an e-mail certifying acceptance of the e-filing done for 2014.

Lion Bateman says thanks to the district for all their support in the past.
