After advertising with 2500 postcards to the homes of young families in the community, flyers into restaurants and businesses and 3 or 4 Facebook sites we had a total 30 Lions and 1 person from the community.

# **Northeast Pa. Lions Service Foundation Reports Actions**

The Northeast Pa. Lions Service Foundation met on March 13. The board voted unanimously to release the final \$25,000 grant to Salus University to be used for support of graduate students in the Dept. of Blindness and Low Vision Studies.

The Foundation will be a major sponsor of the Strides Walk at the State Convention in May. Esight and Nu-eyes will also be there exhibiting new eyeglass technologies.

NEPALSF distributed

a quarter million dollars in grant money to aid Lion, Lioness and Leo clubs in service to their communities. Since November, the foundation has approved three Buddy Wagon grants for pediatric patients and \$15,000 to the Center for Loss Vision for Kaleidoscope Program which helps at-large clients accept, adjust and cope with vision loss. # **Childhood Cancer Devastating to** Families, Say Angel 39 Leaders

When a child in the hospital. family is stricken with cancer, it can be devastating not only to the child, but also to the family, said Doug Sheriff of the Angel 39 Foundation at a seminar given on April 27 to persons attending a seminar at the District 14-K convention.

Long term or short term, it can cost from \$34,000 to \$40,000 out of pocket in financial needs when a child is in the

The foundation provides financial assistance through food, travel expense to the hospital, overnight stays, loss of work time, medical coverage, and the CHIP pro-

But there are emotional needs as well struggle through loss of work and turning life upside down and meeting needs of other siblings. Even if a child is in

remission, for the next 5 or 10 years or longer, there must be maintenance and a follow-up with teams of rehabilitators, or heart or lung problems due to certain chemotherapy drugs or radiation therapy.

Angel 39 has fundraisers, and Mrs. Linda Sheriff said people are generous. She noted one man who asked her, "Can I give you more money?" It nearly brought her to tears at the generosity of people.

"We raise all that money, and all of a sudden it's all gone," said Sheriff. "When they get in the hospital it can cost half a million dollars." He said they are hoping to get a commitment from the Lions. "We need your help." He said there's not a non-profit in the country that matches what they do with every dollar.

District Governor Karlene Laub was at the seminar, along with more than a dozen other people. She said that at a women's symposium held late in April they discussed how they can help, and it was suggested that two people in each club could come up with ideas. "We're going to partner with Angel 39 because it means so much to us and our families," said D.G. Karlene.


