# District Governor Brady Making Visits to Clubs

But as time took its toll and members either passed away or were dropped for lack of paying dues, that number has dropped drastically. Our club secretary suggested in his newsletter, "If our

## Pa. Lions Sight Conservation & Eye Research Foundation



The Pennsylvania Lions Sight Conservation & Research Foundation held the annual research seminar in mid-October. What an eye opening experience! No pun intended.

Six researchers gave us updates on the progress they've made in their research. Topics included retinal degenerative diseases, macular degeneration, glaucoma, dietary supplements and their relevance in treating retinal diseases. As we age, macular degeneration will become a reality for more of us, and I found the discussions on this topic interesting. Do they have a cure? Not at this time. Early detection is the key to saving what vision we have. We should all be more aware of changes in our vision and visit our eye care specialist at the fight sign of a problem.

Another interesting presentation had to do with a new delivery method for eye drops. For those with glaucoma who must give themselves eye drops on a daily basis, or for those who have had recent surgery and need to follow a regimen of eye drops, getting those drops in your eyes isn't always the easiest thing to do. My mother has arthritis, and she struggled getting drops in her eyes after recent cataract surgery. One of the researchers is working on a type of drop that is liq-uid at room temperature, but becomes a gel as it warms up. The drop is placed in the pocket formed by pulling out the lower eyelid. The gel that is formed is non-irritating. It is currently being tested on rabbits. The gel releases medicine over a 30-day period. At the end of that time, saline eye drops are used to flush out the remains of the gel. This is an extremely interesting concept for those who have difficulty with the small bottles that eye drops come in.

If you still have the coin cards that PDG Glen Santee has handed out for a number of years, consider filling them or writing a check to the Foundation. The grants the Foundation gives allows researchers to work on sight related issues that will help many of us as we age, as well as helping our children in the future.

Don't forget to "Ask 1" person to join you in a service project or at a Lions meeting.
