

District Governor Laub Calls Special Meeting on Members

In a telephone message on Wednesday, October 24, First Vice District Governor Donald Kaufman alerted Past District Governors, and Club Presidents, Immediate Club Presidents, Immediate Club Secretaries that District Governor Karlene Laub has called a Special Meeting for Monday, November 5 at 7:00 p.m. in the lower level of Christ U.C.C. Church at 5050 Airport Road, Allentown.

He said, "A few weeks ago a survey questionnaire was sent to each club in District 14-K. The results from each of you are very telling and validate the fact that too many clubs are struggling with leadership and membership issues as well as volunteerism with fundraisers. District leadership is also struggling."

As a District, our membership has fallen from as high as 1,250 to its present 869. We have lost 1/3 of our members!

District Governor Karlene is calling for this Special Meeting to address The Future of Our Clubs and Our District.

We have to get together to determine how we can get and keep new members if we are to survive as a district. It is important that as many of those club officers attend to offer their suggestions on what we can do in regard to boosting membership.

\$36,000 in Checks and Pledges At District 14-K Needs Breakfast

The Lions, Lioness and Leo clubs of District 14-K brought checks and pledges totaling \$36,000 to the Center for Vision Loss needs breakfast on Saturday, Oct. 20 at the Northampton Banquet & Events Center.

Most of the district clubs were in attendance, each represented by three of their members. They were welcomed first by Doug Yingling of CVL. After the invocation by PCC Lowell Hawk, the Lions toast was followed by remarks by District Governor Karlene Laub, who showed the glass tro-

phy the Lions District was awarded as the 2018 Accessibility Champion at the recent Lehigh Valley Night4Sight banquet.

Dennis Zehner, CVL's Director of Development & Marketing, was introduced by Yingling. He ran a video which was a short history of the former Association of the Blind & Visually Impaired (ABVI) and the Lions working with them.

Yingling then presented patches to the clubs for the amounts they contributed last year, and he explained how the money was spent for 504 clients

in services that maintains their independence, improves their life skills, helps with escorted transportation rides, provides vision screening for school children and community members, and agency education programs. A total of 15,564 individuals were reached in 2017-2018.

He pointed out that the agency has evolved to serve people of all ages

2019 District 14-K Convention **Plans Continue**

The election will likely be held before the luncheon and the results announced then.

and visual capabilities with the growth of its rehabilitation and prevention services in its service areas of Lehigh, Northampton Warren counties. He noted, too, that direct services provided by individuals is important, and said that a foundation called Kaleidoscope has been started, and that Diane Michaels is running classes, one of which is cooking.

Dawn Sellers spoke on CVL's prevention programs, particularly the vision screening of school children. The youngsters learn and play games at "It's the same time. rewarding and changes their lives," as visual deficiencies are detected, she said. Mrs. Sellers challenged the clubs to reach out and provide at least one eye exam and glasses to a person each year. 'CVL could not provide all the services we do without the funding of the Lions," she conclud-After the program was over, she answered about questions screening, and said she can screen 40 children in one hour, and with 250 children she can use additional help.

Several other staff members were introduced by Yingling. He said he's a (Emmaus) Lion, and knows what they do, when he got up at 5:30 one morning to help with a fund-raiser.

Then he called one club after the other, Lions, Lionesses and Leos. They responded with hundreds and thousands of dollars in checks and pledges for the Center for Vision Loss needs. With a goal of \$55,000, more funds are expected from clubs that were not present at the breakfast.

The totals needed include: \$42,500 for operations support; \$5,000 for escorted transportation; \$5,000 for screenings for children; and \$2,500 for the eye heart vision fund.
