increasing mobility, selfesteem, responsibilities (such as household chores), identifying money, learning kitchen skills such as cutting vegetables, measuring ingredients, and oven safety, and other life skills.

While the participants were at Camp "I CAN" they had an opportunity to meet and play with a seeing-eye dog, interact with animals at their trip to the Lehigh Valley Zoo, learn about fire safety from the Allentown Fire Department and tour a fire truck.

The "needs night" audience was told that the most important part of the camp was making new friends and celebrating their successes. Each participant was given a certificate for his or her success.

Then followed the call for needs, and one by one the clubs reported what each was giving that night or pledging for the year. It ended with that \$46,350 total.

The Center for Vision Loss has its main office in Allentown, plus an eye care clinic in the Monroe office. They provide vision rehabilitation services to help support quality of life, vision screening for children and adults, educational programs, vision help with eye exams and glasses, low vision exams to enhance remaining vision, adaptive technology with video and digital magnifying devices, and have a vision aids store that includes large print items, talking clocks and watches, and cooking utensils.

# Visually Impaired Student Shows Lions Technology That Helps Her

A visually impaired student at Central Catholic High School in Allentown spoke to members of the Bath Lions Club at their dinner meeting on September 17.

Maddie Link, a junior at the school, showed the Lions some of the modern technology that helps her study and do her homework. Book reading devices, a magnifier, and a laptop with Braille keyboard for the letters are some of the implements. Maddie types all her notes on the Braille device, and she can play them back. When she takes a test it goes on a flash drive with the Braille. Her Victor reader has the equivalent of seven textbooks. She has also scanned a textbook and put it in the reader.

She attended a summer seminar at Penn State University for the blind on independent living and was one of four with the poorest vision. As part of the program, the blind and visually impaired students were given their own iPads. Maddie said Apple is a pioneer in making devices with acceptable functions for the blind. The academy also taught mobility.

While math is difficult for her on the reader, Maddie has no problem doing honors chemistry and honors geology for her homework. There are user manuals on it, which she uses.

A teenager, she is one of the few people her age who Continued on Page 4

has a guide dog. "Snow Bird" was at her side as she spoke. But she has to speak in French to the dog, because he was raised by a French family. She has had the dog since her freshman year, and to get around she has to tell "Snow Bird" where to go. There are some apps on her iPad, so she put directions on it, such as street addresses, how many intersections, and other directions

The iPad can also scan and when a \$10 bill was held up to the device by her mother, Kathy, the iPad told her

audibly what the denomination was. It can read American currency, but no coins, she said.

Maddie has very poor vision, having a condition that affected her retina. Kathy said when her daughter was an infant she had no light perception at six months old. Her vision leveled out to what it is now at age 11. Kathy said when the family took a trip, Maddie sat in the back seat of the car going over her user manual.

Although in 11th grade, she has already started a college search. Maddie would like to attend Georgetown University, but it is important that any college where she is accepted has student support services, she said. To help her, Lions Charitable Enterprises has awarded Maddie a \$2,000 scholarship.
