



Lions 14-K Cabinet Secretary Fatzinger Succumbs to Illness

Lion Cheryl A. (Knauss) Fatzinger, 68, of Macungie, died on Thursday, Sept. 20, 2018. She was the wife of Lion David G. Fatzinger for 50 years.

She spent many years serving as a receptionist, secretary and administrative assistant. Later in life she became a caregiver for Home Instead until her illness forced her to retire in 2015. She was a very active member of the Mountainville Lions Club, and in Lions District 14-K where she was a very dedicated Cabinet Secretary. She had received such honors as a Melvin Jones Fellow, Lions of PA Foundation Pinnacle, the President's Medal, and Leadership Medal. Cheryl was a member of the Lutheran Church of the Holy Spirit in Emmaus.

Both Campbell and Outreach Liaison Bob Rapp went out in the audience and told about what they are doing as they shook everybody's hands and answered their questions.

The homeless average between 30 and 50 years of age, Campbell said. They need our prayers as well as other treatment, Rapp noted. The homeless come from many areas, including the Lehigh Valley, and one is even a college professor.

MD-14 House of Delegates To Convene November 3

The Multiple District -14 House of Delegates will convene at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday, November 3, 2018, as part of the second 2018-2019 State Council meetings at the Hilton Garden Inn, Indiana at IUP, 714 Pratt Drive Indiana, PA.

A "special election" to officially endorse MD-14's candidate for International Director will be held Saturday, February 7, 2019, as part of the third 2018-2019 State Council meetings at the Altoona Grand Hotel, 1 Sheraton Drive, Altoona, PA.

Any MD-14 Lion in good standing in a club in good standing with Lions Clubs International, Multiple District 14, and their sub-district is eligible to be a candidate for the office of International Director.

In accordance with Lions Clubs International by-laws Article II Section 3, paragraphs a, b, c, d, and the MD-14 House of Delegates Procedure: Lions interested in being considered as a candidate the office International Director must prepare a letter of intent and Lions resume in printed form and present documents those his/her club's board of directors for the purpose of receiving the club's official endorsement. Likewise, all interested candidates are asked to submit a Letter of Intent and Lions resume to the PA Council of Lions Clubs Office, 949 East Park Drive, Harrisburg, PA 17111 prior to September 30, 2018.

After receiving the club's endorsement, these

documents must be forwarded to the candidate's District Governor for approval by the sub-district's delegates at a special convention called for the purpose of providing the sub-district's endorsement of the candidate.

The letters of endorsement from both the club and sub-district must be dated and signed by the appropriate club and sub-district officers and presented in written form to the State Office by October 19, 2018.

Upon receipt of the official endorsement letters from the appropriate club and sub-district, the candidate for the office of International Director will be invited to the State Office to meet with the International Family and may officially announce his/her intentions.
